Health and Safety Law
What you need to know

All workers have a right to work in places where risks to their health and safety are properly controlled. Health and safety is about stopping you getting hurt at work or ill through work. Your employer is responsible for health and safety, but you must help.

What employers must do for you

1. Identify what could harm you in your work and the people you work with. This is part of risk assessment.
2. In a way you can understand, control the risks of the work you do and the people you work with as far as is reasonably practicable.
3. Control and reduce the risks of work and the people you work with by preventing or reducing the risks from the work you do.
4. Find out what you can do to help control the risks you work with.

6. Follow the training you have been given about the work you do.
7. Report any risks you see to your employer or supervisor.

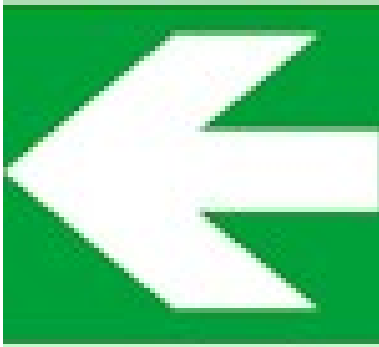

To comply with The Fire Precautions (Workplace) Regulations which require any automatic fire-fighting equipment to be indicated with a sign. All signs are compliant with BS 5499-1, BS5499-5 and The Health & Safety (Safety Signs & Signals) Regulations 1996.



Nite Glo Signs

These photoluminescent signs will provide high visibility in the dark, in the event of a power failure.

A light source is needed to charge the signs (normal office lighting is sufficient) and they can be recharged any number of times.
